

FRIDAY NIGHT COURSES

Weekend College is expanding classes to Friday nights Summer 2008 in an effort to reach out to the many non-traditional students coping with work and family.

ART 1010 WL6 – Introduction to Visual Arts will be offered Friday evenings from 5:30 p.m. to 9:50 p.m. in the Gunter Trades Building.

This course is an introductory class that offers General Education credit for Fine Arts.

In this course, you will develop an appreciation for art. You will be able to identify major art forms, survey art history and become a critic to art and media.

ART 1010 will be taught by Jerry Day who works at UVU as a Coordinator for Marketing and Design for the Student Life Departments on campus.

HIST 4750 WL6 – Civil War/Reconstruction will be offered Friday evenings from 5:30 p.m. to 9:50 p.m. in the Liberal Arts Building.

This course describes the forces at work in the antebellum period that led to the Civil War. You will examine the military, political, social, economic, and racial issues before, during, and after the war.

HIST 4750 will be taught by Albert Winkler who works in the History Library at BYU and has taught numerous history classes at UVU.

NUTR 1020 WL6 – Foundations of Human Nutrition will be taught by Steve Fabis in the Liberal Arts Building on Friday evenings from 4:30 p.m. to 9:00 p.m..

NUTR 1020 is for students interested in various health care professions and is now a pre-requisite for students applying for the Nursing Program at UVU.

You will study the factors that influence nutritive requirements and maintenance of nutritional balance. You will also examine the relationships between proper nutrition and social, mental and physical well-being.

POLS 3500 WL6 – International Relations of the Middle East will also be offered Friday evenings from 5:00 p.m. to 9:30 p.m. in the Liberal Arts Building.

You will cover the impact of the West on the Middle East, the Arab-Israeli wars, the rise of Islamic fundamentalists terrorist groups and regimes, the Iran-Iraq war, the Iraq-Kuwait-US war, the Impact of 9-11, as well as the foreign policies of several major states in the Middle East.

POLS 3500 will be taught by the Honorable Baktybek Abdrisaev, Ambassador to the USA & Canada from the Kyrgyz Republic (a former Soviet Republic located next to China).

PSY 1010 WL6 – General Psychology will be held Friday evenings 5:00 p.m. to

9:30 p.m. in the Liberal Arts Building.

PSY 1010 will be taught by Phyllis Bushman who works for Nebo School District as a Psychologist and Counselor at Hubble Creek Elementary.

General Psychology is an introductory course in modern scientific psychology that offers General Education credit for Social and Behavioral Sciences.

The course will cover major domains of scientific psychology including biological foundations, sensations, perception, learning, motivation, human development and abnormal psychology. You will examine major psychological and professional applications in this course.

PSY 1100 WL6 – Human Development Life Span will also be held Friday evenings in the Liberal Arts Building from 5:00 p.m. to 9:30 p.m..

Jim Bushman will be teaching this course along with his major role as a School Counselor for Nebo School District at Spanish Fork High School.

PSY 1100 is an integrated approach to human development from conception and birth to old age and death. This course also provides General Education credit for Social and Behavioral Sciences.

In this course, you will examine your own growth and development patterns and learn to understand the characteristics of various development stages.

You will also study the major physical, cognitive and psychosocial themes and issues of human development including genetics, prenatal development, birth, early/middle/late childhood, adolescence, early/middle/late adulthood, and death.

SOC 3400 WL6 – Sociology of Religion will be taught by Jason Singh in the Liberal Arts Building on Friday evenings from 4:00 p.m. to 8:30 p.m..

SOC 3400 examines religion from a sociological perspective and analyzes religion as a social phenomenon.

You will discuss religious organizations, religion and politics, and religion and social class.
