UVSC will accept the Residual ACT taken only at UVSC. Minimum scores are ACT English and Math 19, SAT Verbal and Math 500. Exceptions to these requirements are:

Student who are 21 or older by the admissions deadline will only be required to take the New Student Assessment.

If you have 15 or more transferable credits or are 21 or older and have not completed English and Math, the New Student Assessment will be required before registering for classes.
